

Fellowship Name	Brief Description
AmeriCorps	Each year, AmeriCorps offers 75,000 opportunities for adults of all ages and backgrounds to serve through a network of partnerships with local and national nonprofit groups. Full-time members who complete their service earn a Segal AmeriCorps Education Award of \$4,725 to pay for college, graduate school, or to pay back qualified student loans; members who serve part-time receive a partial Award.
Bolashak Fellow	The program is designed to train future leaders in business, international relations, law, science, engineering, and other key fields. Upon completion of their programs, scholarship recipients return to Kazakhstan to perform government service for a period of five years.
Brockman Foundation	Candidate must have completed primary, secondary, and university education in Mexico. Candidate must evidence a high level of proficiency in English (speaking, writing, reading), with a minimum TOEFL score of 250 on the computer-based test, or 100 on the internet-based test. Candidate must have at least two years of professional work experience by the time of enrollment in the program. Candidate must be less than 30 years of age at the time of application. Candidate must compete for the scholarship on the basis of need and merit. Candidate must agree to return to work in Mexico within 2 years after finishing his/her Master's Degree.
Colfuturo	This is COLFUTURO's first and most important sponsor program. It finances the costs of graduate studies around the world up to a maximum of US\$25,000 per year and for a maximum two year stay abroad. Its main objective is to provide Colombian students with more and better study opportunities and enable them to contribute with their experiences of studying abroad to the economic and social development of Colombia.
Conacyt Fellow	Columbia University and Mexico's National Council of Science and Technology, Consejo Nacional de Ciencia y Tecnología (CONACYT) have established CONACYT-Columbia Fellowships to guarantee full funding for qualifying Mexican students who have been accepted to doctoral programs at Columbia University in identified common interest areas.
Ford International Fellowships Program	IFP is a fellowship program uniquely designed to promote social justice, community development, and access to higher education. As the single largest program ever supported by the Ford Foundation, IFP advances the Foundation's mission around the world. The program supports talented individuals from marginalized social groups, and encourages them to use their leadership skills and knowledge to work toward positive social change in their home communities and countries.
Foreign Area Officer (US Armed Forces Only)	A Foreign Area Officer (FAO) is a commissioned officer from any of the four branches of the United States armed forces who are regionally-focused experts in political-military operations possessing a unique combination of strategic focus, regional expertise, with political, cultural, sociological, economic, and geographic awareness, and foreign language proficiency in at least one of the dominant languages in their specified region. Each branch has its own process for developing Foreign Area Officers to address their specific needs

Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS)	<p>The Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowships program provides allocations of academic year and summer fellowships to institutions of higher education or consortia of institutions of higher education to assist meritorious undergraduate students and graduate students undergoing training in modern foreign languages and related area or international studies. Eligible students apply for fellowships directly to an institution that has received an allocation of fellowships from the U.S. Department of Education.</p>
Fulbright (IIE) for Study Outside United States	<p>A mainstay of America's public-diplomacy efforts, the Fulbright Foreign Student Program brings citizens of other countries to the United States for Master's degree or Ph.D. study at U.S. universities or other appropriate institutions. The program has brought some of the world's finest minds to U.S. campuses and offers program participants' insight into U.S. society and values.</p>
Fulbright For Study in the United States (International Students Only)	<p>Is the largest U.S. international exchange program offering opportunities for students, scholars, and professionals to undertake international graduate study, advanced research, university teaching, and teaching in elementary and secondary schools worldwide.</p>
Global Scholar	<p>The Global Scholars Program is a unique partnership of public and private institutions of higher education that aims to encourage and prepare college students from diverse ethnic backgrounds to enter careers in international affairs and national security. The Global Scholars Program joins Hostos Community College with Columbia University's School of General Studies (GS) and School of International & Public Affairs (SIPA) to provide participants with the educational and professional background necessary for leadership roles in foreign affairs and national defense.</p>
Institute for International Public Policy (IIPP)	<p>The Institute enhances US national security and global competitiveness by promoting excellence, international service, and awareness among a broader, more representative cross-section of the American citizenry. We prepare a cadre of well-trained, language proficient minority young people to compete in the global marketplace. The Institute helps ensure that those entrusted with the affairs of the United States reflects the diversity that defines us as Americans and confronts us as citizens of our global village. Japan/World Bank Scholarship	<p>The Joint Japan/ World Bank Graduate Scholarship Program (JJ/WBGSP), awards scholarships to individuals from World Bank member countries to undertake graduate studies at universities renowned for their development research and teaching. In its Regular Program, the JJ/WBGSP has awarded scholarships to 3,412 scholars chosen from a total of 61,319 applicants.</p>
Luce Fellowship	<p>The Luce Scholars Program is a nationally competitive fellowship program to enhance the understanding of Asia among potential leaders in American society. The program provides stipends, language training, and individualized professional placement in Asia for 15-18 Luce Scholars each year, and welcomes applications from college seniors, graduate students, and young professionals in a variety of fields who have had limited exposure to Asia.</p>

<u>McNair Fellow</u>	<p>The McNair Scholars Program is a U.S. Department of Education Federal TRIO Program. The USC Office of Undergraduate Programs provides administrative oversight for the program and makes available opportunities for all students to participate in an array of academic, co-curricular, and funding programs. The core components of the USC McNair Scholars Program include a Spring Research Methods Course, Summer Research Institute (SRI), Annual Research Symposium, GRE Test Preparation, Travel Grant Awards for Conference Attendance and University Visitations, and Academic & Career Advising.</p>
<u>Mohammed Bin Rashid Al Maktoum Foundation</u>	<p>Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum Foundation offers graduate scholarships for Arab students through its Fellows Programme. The Programme aims at developing the knowledge capabilities of talented youth across the Arab World, by offering scholarships to pursue Master's Degree programmes in Business Administration (MBA), Public Administration (MPA), Public Policy (MPP) and Finance at leading international universities.</p>
<u>Edmund S. Muskie Graduate Fellowship Program</u>	<p>The Muskie program provides emerging leaders from Eurasia, an intensive academic study and professional training in their chosen fields. In addition to their academic programs, Muskie fellows gain exposure to American values through community service activities and develop professional skills through a full-time internship in their field of study.</p>
<u>Peace Corps (Paul D. Coverdell Fellows)</u>	<p>The Paul D. Coverdell Fellows Program (formerly known as Fellows/USA) offers returned Volunteers scholarships or reduced tuition, stipends, and internships at more than 50 participating campuses in a variety of subject areas, combining graduate study with substantive, degree-related internships that help meet the needs of underserved American communities. Fellows teach in public schools, work in public health facilities, and contribute to community development projects at nonprofit organizations. Volunteers can apply for Fellows/USA any time after they complete their Peace Corps service.</p>
<u>Graduate Foreign Affairs Fellowship</u>	<p>The Graduate Foreign Affairs Fellowship is for students who enroll in two-year master's degree programs in public policy, international affairs, public administration, or academic fields such as business, economics, political science, sociology, or foreign languages, who represent all ethnic, racial and social backgrounds and who have an interest in pursuing a Foreign Service career in the U.S. Department of State. The program develops a source of trained men and women who will represent the skill needs of the Department and who are dedicated to representing America's interests abroad.</p>
<u>Undergraduate Pickering Foreign Affairs Fellowship</u>	<p>The Pickering Undergraduate Foreign Affairs Fellowship seeks to recruit talented students in academic programs relevant to international affairs, political and economic analysis, administration, management, and science policy. The goal is to attract outstanding students from all ethnic, racial, and social backgrounds who have an interest in pursuing a Foreign Service career in the U.S. Department of State. The Program develops a source of trained men and women from academic disciplines representing the skill needs of the Department, who are dedicated to representing America's interests abroad.</p>

Public Policy and International Affairs Fellowship Program (PPIA)	<p>A major objective of the PPIA Fellowship is for students to achieve a Master's Degree or joint degree, typically in public policy, public administration, international affairs or a related degree. After completing a Junior Summer Institute, PPIA Fellows are aggressively recruited from the PPIA Graduate School Consortium where they are entitled to a minimum of \$5,000 towards their tuition. Very often they receive well above and beyond that amount. Summer Institute Report Required.</p>
Rangel Fellow (US Citizen or Perm Res)	<p>Each year, the Rangel Program selects 10 outstanding Rangel Fellows in a highly competitive nationwide process. These Fellows receive up to \$32,500 annually in assistance for tuition, room, board and other related expenses for a two-year master's degree in international affairs or a related topic. They also do internships at U.S. Embassies overseas and on Capitol Hill. Each Fellow is committed to a minimum of three years of service in an appointment as a Foreign Service Officer.</p>
Ron Brown Scholar Program	<p>The Ron Brown Scholar Program seeks to identify African-American high school seniors who will make significant contributions to society. Applicants must excel academically, exhibit exceptional leadership potential, participate in community service activities and demonstrate financial need. The applicant must be a US citizen or hold a permanent resident visa card. Current college students are not eligible to apply.</p>
Soros Fellow	<p>The purpose of The Paul & Daisy Soros Fellowships for New Americans is to provide opportunities for continuing generations of able and accomplished New Americans to achieve leadership in their chosen fields. The Program is established in recognition of the contributions New Americans have made to American life and in gratitude for the opportunities the United States has afforded the donors and their family.</p>
Teach for America	<p>Teach For America corps members commit to teach for two years in low-income communities, and then go on as alumni to lead efforts to change the face of public education.</p>
Trace Fellow	<p>Fellowship support is available to graduate students, educators and in-service professionals undertaking research to support education, culture, healthcare or rural development in Tibetan communities. Guidelines for Fellowship Application are available</p>
U.S. Army Expanded Graduate School Program	<p>Additional graduate school opportunities to outstanding junior officers to enhance development of the broader intellectual capital required in a Joint and Expeditionary Army. The increased number of graduate school opportunities will be offered this year to officers in Year Groups 1998 through 2003, with a portion beginning attendance in FY07. The majority of officers will generally begin attendance between their 8th and 12th year of service. Officers in Year Groups 2004 and 2005 will be offered increased graduate school opportunities in their respective third year of service.</p>
PEPM World Bank	<p>Early in 1991, the JJ/WBGSP Steering Committee endorsed an initiative of the World Bank's Economic Development Institute to add a variation to the conventional JJ/WBGSP. Under this Program, about 15 scholars would be concentrated at a university located close to the World Bank headquarters for intensive studies leading to a master's degree related to the fields of Economic Policy and Management.</p>

The Yellow Ribbon Program is a unique Post-9/11 GI Bill education program that increases service members' educational options by allowing schools to partner with the Veterans Administration (VA) to reduce educational costs for military students. Under the Yellow Ribbon Program, the schools whose tuition exceeds the maximum amount covered under the Post-9/11 GI Bill can agree to pay a certain percentage of the overage, which the VA then matches. In the end, schools that participate in this program limit the out-of-pocket costs for eligible students. Maximum tuition funding under the Post-9/11 GI Bill varies by state, but is defined as the highest tuition rate for a service member pursuing an undergraduate degree at an in-state, public school.
