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ANNOUNCING: KENT SUMMER TRAINING MAY 20-24, 2024

Technology and Conflict: Anticipating Change for Better and for Worse

The five-day tuition-free Kent Conflict Resolution Summer Training will take place in-person in New York between May 20th-May 24th, 2024 and combines experiential skills building and expert panel discussions. This intensive course will familiarize a select group of mid-career diplomats with the emerging dynamics of 21st century conflict and the tools, knowledge, and negotiating techniques that are necessary to address these dynamics. Specifically, participants will engage with the opportunities provided by "The Golden Triangle," a reference to the synergistic potential for cooperation between stakeholders in government, civil society, and the private sector. Participants will receive a packet of training materials before arriving in New York. Those who successfully complete the training will receive a Certificate of Participation from Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs.

The 2024 Summer Training will center around a new theme of Technology and Conflict: Anticipating Change for Better and for Worse, recognizing that technological breakthroughs will change the landscape of conflict in unpredictable ways. Advances in remote warfare, the manipulation of information, and artificial intelligence presage a multiplicity of possible paths, contingent on the relative level of diffusion of these technologies. What choices can governments, civil society and the businesses responsible for the development of these technologies make in concert to harness technology as a catalyst for peace while countering its latent potential to spread conflict?

ABOUT THE TRAINING:

The training centers around an **in-depth simulation and a case study**, which are augmented by **high-level panels** featuring senior officials from governments and international organizations, CEOs of major corporations, and leaders of prominent NGOs. As a distinctive feature of the training, the simulation will bring to the world of diplomacy some of the methods used in business schools. Last year's simulation and case study centered around the training's overarching theme of **Expanding Avenues of Conflict**. The simulation took form as a Peace Summit in Geneva, asking participants to come together as political, military, business, and civil society stakeholders to address a persisting civil war, while the case study asked participants to address the destabilization of a multi-ethic country, recently recovered from a long civil war, caused by a wave of migration from a neighboring country with a similar ethnic composition suffering through a civil war of its own.

This program is designed for promising young diplomats serving in overseas missions or in the foreign ministries of their home countries. Candidates are expected to have some years of professional experience and a demonstrated commitment to international conflict resolution and peacebuilding, as well as be strongly recommended by their respective missions/ministries.

What are the program costs?

Thanks to the generosity of the donor, this training is offered by Columbia University to participating diplomats free of charge. Attendees are, however, expected to cover their travel and lodging costs in New York. In exceptional cases, financial aid may be granted; upon acceptance into the training, attendees may inquire for more information.

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
